Hussein Mahfouz:

Good afternoon, everyone and thank you for joining us today. This is Hussein Mahfouz from Arqaam Capital and I am pleased to welcome you to Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait's (ABK) 9M 2025 earnings webcast.

I have with me here today, from ABK's management, Mr. Giel-Jan M. Van Der Tol, Group Chief Executive Officer; Mr. Shiamak Soonawalla, Group Chief Financial Officer; Dr. Abdulaziz Jawad, Chief Strategy Officer; and Mr. Yousef Mukhtar, Executive Manager – Strategy.

I will now hand the call over to Mr. Yousef.

Yousef Mukhtar:

Good afternoon, everyone and thank you for joining us today for our nine months of 2025 earnings webcast.

We will start our call with a disclaimer. I would like to bring to your attention that certain comments in this presentation may constitute forward-looking statements. These comments reflect the Bank's expectations and are subject to risks and uncertainties that may cause actual results to differ materially and may adversely affect the outcome and financial effects of the plans described herein. We will continue the call with an overview from ABK's GCEO, Mr. Giel-Jan M. Van Der Tol. He will be followed by ABK's GCFO, Mr. Shiamak Soonawalla, who will provide an extended review on financials and performance. ABK's CSO, Dr. Abdulaziz Jawad, will then provide us with an overall update on ABK, its strategy, and major projects.

We will answer any questions received through the webcast platform. I trust everybody has had a chance to review our earnings release documents. They're available, including the earnings presentation that we'll be referring to during the call, on the Investor Relations section of ABK's website.

Giel-Jan M. Van Der Tol:

Thank you, Yousef. Good afternoon, everyone, and thank you for joining us today. It's a pleasure to connect with you as we review ABK's performance for the nine months of 2025. A period marked by solid progress, strong execution, and continued delivery on our strategic priorities.

Starting with key financial highlights of this period, ABK achieved robust performance, with net profit attributable to shareholders increasing 20% year on year to KD 46.6 million, compared to KD38.8 million in the same period last year. Earnings per share also improved to 16 fils, up from 15 fils in the same period last year.

ABK's loan portfolio grew 5% year-on-year, reflecting measured growth underpinned by firm credit control and sound portfolio governance. Asset quality remains resilient, with our NPL ratio maintained at 1.29%, demonstrating a well-balanced approach to growth and prudent risk management.

Our CET1 ratio stands at 11.96%, and total capital adequacy ratio at 16.94%, well above the regulatory thresholds, reflecting the bank's solid capitalization and financial strength.

During the third quarter, ABK marked a major milestone with the successful launch of its first USD 500 million certificate of deposit program, approved by the Central Bank of Kuwait. This issue was fully subscribed within a short period, attracting strong participation from international investors across Asia and United States, reaffirming market confidence in ABK's credit strength and financial resilience.



Fitch reaffirmed ABK's "A" rating with stable outlook in September 2025, while Moody's upheld "A2" in May 2025, a continued endorsement of the bank's sound credit profile and governance standards.

We continue to advance our digital transformation agenda this quarter with new features and upgrades across our mobile and online platforms, enhancing speed, personalization and accessibility. In parallel, we continue to modernize our branch network ensuring delivery of a seamless, customer experience across all channels.

Our people remain the driving force behind ABK's continued progress. Kuwaitis represent 73% of our leadership team, while females account for 40% of our human capital. We continue to invest in our people and create an environment that inspires innovation, collaboration and high performance.

As we move into the final quarter of the year, our priorities remain focused on sustaining profitability, maintaining strong assets quality and accelerating digital transformation journey, ensuring sustainable value creation for shareholders.

Thank you for your continued trust and partnership.

I will now hand it over to my colleague, Mr. Shiamak Soonawalla, our Group CFO, who will take us through the detailed financial aspects of our presentation.

Shiamak Soonawalla:

Thank you, Mr. Giel-Jan, and a warm welcome to everyone to our earnings call for the nine months of 2025. We are pleased to report another period of steady performance across all our key financial and operational indicators, reflecting our disciplined execution, and continued focus on sustainable profitability.

Starting with our financial results, net profit attributable to shareholders increased by 20% year on year to reach KD 46.6 million. Earnings per share stood at 16 fils.

Operating income for the period reached KD 165.1 million, up by 9% year on year, reflecting steady revenue growth across key business lines. Operating profit increased 18% to KD 95.1 million, driven by effective cost management, improved efficiency, and positive operating leverage. These results reaffirm the resilience of our diversified business model and its ability to generate sustainable returns.



Asset quality remained strong, with the Group's non-performing loan (NPL) ratio stable at a healthy level of 1.29%, and loan loss coverage ratio maintained at 475%, underscoring the stability of our credit portfolio. Our Loan loss provisions in accordance with Central Bank of Kuwait guidelines exceeded IFRS 9 requirements by KD 230 million, reflecting a conservative and disciplined risk approach.

Our net interest margin (NIM) improved to 2.3%, up from 2.2% in H1 2025, supported by prudent pricing and effective funding cost control. Return on average equity (ROAE) stood at 8.5% for the 9 months of 2025, broadly in line with the same period last year.

Liquidity and funding continued to demonstrate strength, with a liquidity coverage ratio of 221% and a net stable funding ratio of 112%, both comfortably above regulatory thresholds.

Customer deposits stood at KD 4.2 billion, representing 67% of our total liabilities, highlighting the continued confidence of our clients and the resilience of our funding profile.

During the period, ABK successfully executed its first certificate of deposits issuance in Kuwait, amounting to USD 500 million, marking a major step in diversifying the funding base.

Commercial Banking remained the primary earning driver during the nine months of 2025, contributing 49%, followed by Retail Banking at 36% and Treasury and Investments at 15%. The Group maintained a steady balance sheet composition, with 57% allocated to Commercial Banking, 14% to Retail Banking and 29% to Treasury and Investments.

On efficiency, the cost to income ratio improved to 42.4% for the 9 months of 2025, down from 46.6% same period last year, highlighting our strong operating discipline and the success of our cost optimization initiatives.

As at 30th September 2025, the Group's total assets reached KD 7.1 billion. Net loans and advances increased by 5% to KD 4.8 billion, compared to KD 4.6 billion same period last year, supported by strong lending activity and disciplined risk management.

Together, these results reaffirm the strength of our business model and consistent execution across the markets. We maintained sound asset quality and achieved further efficiency gains, delivering stable and sustainable results.



As we approach year end, our priorities remain focused on profitable growth, balance sheet strength, and long-term value creation for our shareholders.

Thank you for your continued support and trust.

I will now hand over to Dr. Abdulaziz for an update on the Group's strategic priorities.

Dr. Abdulaziz Jawad:

Thank you, Mr. Shiamak. Good afternoon, everyone, and thank you for joining us on our nine months of 2025 earnings call.

Let me start with a quick review of the global environment. According to the IMF's World Economic Outlook (October 2025), the global economy is expected to grow by 3.2% in 2025, and projected to ease further to 3.1 in 2026. Growth in advanced economies is projected to remain moderate at 1.5% between 2025-2026, while emerging and developing economies are expected to stabilize just above 4%, supported by resilient domestic demand and a gradual easing inflation.

On October 29, 2025, the U.S. Federal cut interest rates by 25 basis points, bringing the target range down to 3.75%-4.00%. Headline inflation is expected to decline to 4.2% globally in 2025 and 3.7% in 2026, with notable variation; above target inflation in the United States with risk tilted to the upside and subdued inflation in much of the rest of the world.

Within the region, according to GCC Ministerial and Central Banks Governors meeting with IMF, overall GCC growth is to accelerate to a 3-3.5% range in 2025 and close to 4% in 2026, supported by the resilience of the non-hydrocarbon economy, the unwinding of voluntary oil production cuts, and the expansion of natural gas production.

Turning to Kuwait, the outlook remains stable, supported by credit growth, project execution, and ongoing reform. The IMF projects GDP growth of 2.6% in 2025, with inflation at 2.2%. Although the U.S. federal Reserve reduced interest rates, The Central Bank of Kuwait maintained its discount rate unchanged at 3.75%. The government issued USD 11.25 billion in sovereign bonds, which was oversubscribed 2.5 times, reflecting strong investor confidence. Kuwait is also progressing on housing reforms, launching major projects in Al Mutlaa, Saad Al Abdulla, and Jaber Al Ahmed, creating new opportunities for private investment and bank financing.

In Kuwait retail banking business, we strengthened our position across key segments Kuwaitis, Privilege, and Youth through sharper propositions and stronger engagement. For the youth segment, we deepened relationships by increasing presence at universities, while affluent customers responded well to our lifestyle events. We gained market share in Kuwaiti segment, supporting higher cross-sell and improved profitability momentum while loan growth remained healthy, driven by robust performance in auto finance.



Following this positive momentum, ABK has received five prestigious awards from Global Finance for 2025 such as "Most innovative Digital Bank" and "Best Mobile Banking App" among others, highlighting ABK's success in embracing digital advancement in the banking sector. This achievement reflects our continuous efforts to introduce modern, customer-centric solutions that enhance trust and enable customers to manage their financial needs effortlessly and securely.

Let me now turn to Egypt, where macroeconomic indicators are continuing to improve. The Central Bank cut rates by 1% in October, bringing total reduction to 6.25% year to date as inflation eased to 11.7% in September. GDP grew by 5.0% in Q4 fiscal year 2024/2025, up from 4.8% in the previous quarter, and by 4.4% for the full year, nearly doubling from 2.4% a year earlier. The Egyptian Pound strengthened to EGP 47.22 per USD by end October, while the five years CDS declined to 385bps in September, its lowest in four years, reflecting stronger investor confidence.

In parallel, we made solid progress this quarter where ABK Egypt successfully implemented retail and mobile banking platforms, including CorPay for corporate clients. The bank became the first in Egypt to eliminate the need for separate soft token application, offering a seamless and secure customer experience. We also renewed our decade long partnership with MetLife Egypt, reinforcing our commitment to innovate and customer focused solutions. Additionally, ABK Egypt was recognized as "Best Corporate Banking Service in Egypt 2025" reflecting it growing its growing strength and client trust.

In the UAE, ABK DIFC closed ABK's second Asian syndicated facility successfully refinancing the 2022 USD 500 million term loan. This transaction was upsized by 30% to close at USD 650 million with participation from 17 Asian investors, reinforcing our funding diversification strategy and DIFC's growing role as a regional hub.

Moreover, our consumer banking business continued to strengthen its cross-border growth. We enhanced our UAE mortgage proposition and introduced university banking solutions for Kuwaiti students studying in the UAE, enabling them to open their accounts even before travelling and manage finances seamlessly. These initiatives reinforce ABK's community focus and deepen long term client relationships.

On the corporate side, the team delivered solid growth and participated in the USD 1 billion ADNOC syndication with a USD 100 million contribution, highlighting ABK's growing presence in the regional corporate banking space.

Moving to ABK Capital, our investment arm, ABK Capital DIFC announced a new partnership with LGT Bank (Switzerland) Ltd, one of the world's leading private banks and asset managers. Alongside with Blackstone and Blackrock, this partnership further enhances ABK Capital's position as a regional investment platform, offering clients access to world class investment and advisory solutions.



Last but not least, ABK released its 2024 5th Sustainability Report titled 'Championing ESG', prepared in accordance with global reporting standards. The report underscores the Bank's ongoing commitment to transparency, accountability, and alignment with leading international frameworks such as the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI).

Furthermore, ABK continues to advance its ESG roadmap through initiatives focused on climate resilience, responsible banking, financial inclusion, and community impact. These collective efforts reaffirm ABK's position as a forward-looking institution dedicated to integrating sustainability into every aspect of its operations and supporting Kuwait's 2035 vision towards transitioning to a low-carbon, inclusive economy.

As we move forward towards year end, our focus is on accelerating delivery and deepening impact across all markets. We have built strong momentum supported by solid fundamentals, advancing our transformation agenda and expanding our digital reach. The upcoming Strategy refresh will build on this progress, setting a clear path for the ABK's next phase of growth and value creation.

Thank you for your continued confidence in ABK. I will now turn the call over to Hussein for the Q&A session.



Hussein Mahfouz: If you would like to ask a question, please type your question in the chat box.

What drove the pick-up in loan growth in Q3 2025 and should we expect similar

growth in Q4?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: We've had good loan growth and encouraging loan growth in the 3rd quarter. I see

good growth continuing in the 4th quarter, definitely.

Hussein Mahfouz: Assets yields and funding costs increase sequentially despite lower interest rates,

what was the reason behind that and what should be the impact of recent interest

rate cut in September on the bank's margin in Q4 and 2026?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: If you look at our bank's margin from the 1st half of 2025 to September, we've

improved our margins from 2.2 to 2.3. So, we have structured a balance sheet so that they are well positioned to minimize the impact of a declining interest rate environment. Our work shows us that by the next year, even the interest rates

decline the impact will be marginal between the 4 and 5 basis points.

Hussein Mahfouz: What is your cost of risk guidance for the full year 2025?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: I think of course our risk guidance will be at the same level as you quite well know

and have noted from our call. We maintain one of the highest excess provisions over the IFRS 9 requirements. And this is part of our conservative philosophy, which

we've been following and practicing for the past several years.

Hussein Mahfouz: Your cost of risk is higher than the sector average. Should you expect a lower cost

of risk in 2026 given the very high provision coverage of more than 400%?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: I think you will see our cost of risk to be on the same level which we have

experienced in 2025.

Hussein Mahfouz: What was the loan growth in Kuwait vs the subsidiaries year-to-date?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: If you compare to subsidiaries, loan growth in Kuwait is significant. A

major portion of the growth came from Kuwait, and then it came from Egypt. We had a little bit of a repositioning of our portfolio of the international market given the spreads that we were getting there. So, we've seen a decline. But by and large

the growth has come from Kuwait and Egypt.



Hussein Mahfouz: What drove the decrease in cost to income ratio?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: We've had several cost optimization initiatives. We've been very prudent in our

spending and we had in line with the targets we set out to achieve when we began

our strategic plan way back in 2022.

Hussein Mahfouz: When do you expect banks to start offering mortgage loans and what is the

expected impact on ABK's loan growth?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: I think most Kuwaiti banks are ready for the mortgage loan. It is in the final stages

in the Cabinet of Ministers to be approved. The market size of the

mortgage is pretty large and we expect it to be around KD20 billion and we expect to take a significant market share compared to our current market share in retail

from this new revenue pool.

The impact will definitely be positive for ABK and almost all banks noting that it's

a long tenure facility and supported by the Kuwaiti Government.

Hussein Mahfouz: What is the sensitivity of your net interest margin to 25 bps cut by CBK

and the Fed?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: I already explained that to you. We have very minimal impact because we've

structured and positioned our balance sheet to take care of that of the potential decline in interest rates. So, I gave you around 4 to 5 bps is what we expect for the potential decline that would come next year. Another point that everyone has to understand and recognize is that the Central Bank decline does not follow in suite with the Fed rate decline. We saw that. The Fed reduced the rates by 50 basis

points but the CBK kept it at 25 basis points only.

Hussein Mahfouz: Any target for cost to income ratio?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: I expect the cost to income ratio to be range bound around the same level this year

and next year.

Hussein Mahfouz: In general, how sensitive is your net interest margin to rate cuts in Egypt? What

share of your net interest income is driven by Egypt?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: Egypt net interest income, the rate cuts have not had any major impact on our

NIMs because their balance sheet also is structured in a manner where the interest rate cuts have minimal impact on us. So, looking at about 3 to 4 basis points,

differential, which is there. Not much and not deep.



Hussein Mahfouz: What is your view on liquidity on the Kuwaiti banking sector and are there any

signs of pressure in liquidity in light of the pickup and loan growth?

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: No. Not at all. We all have ample liquidity in the market. There is no fight for deposit

rates. There's nothing, in my opinion. We are flush with liquidity, all banks are.

Hussein Mahfouz: It looks like there are no more questions. Thank you for joining the call today, I

really appreciate your time.

Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait: Thank you very much.





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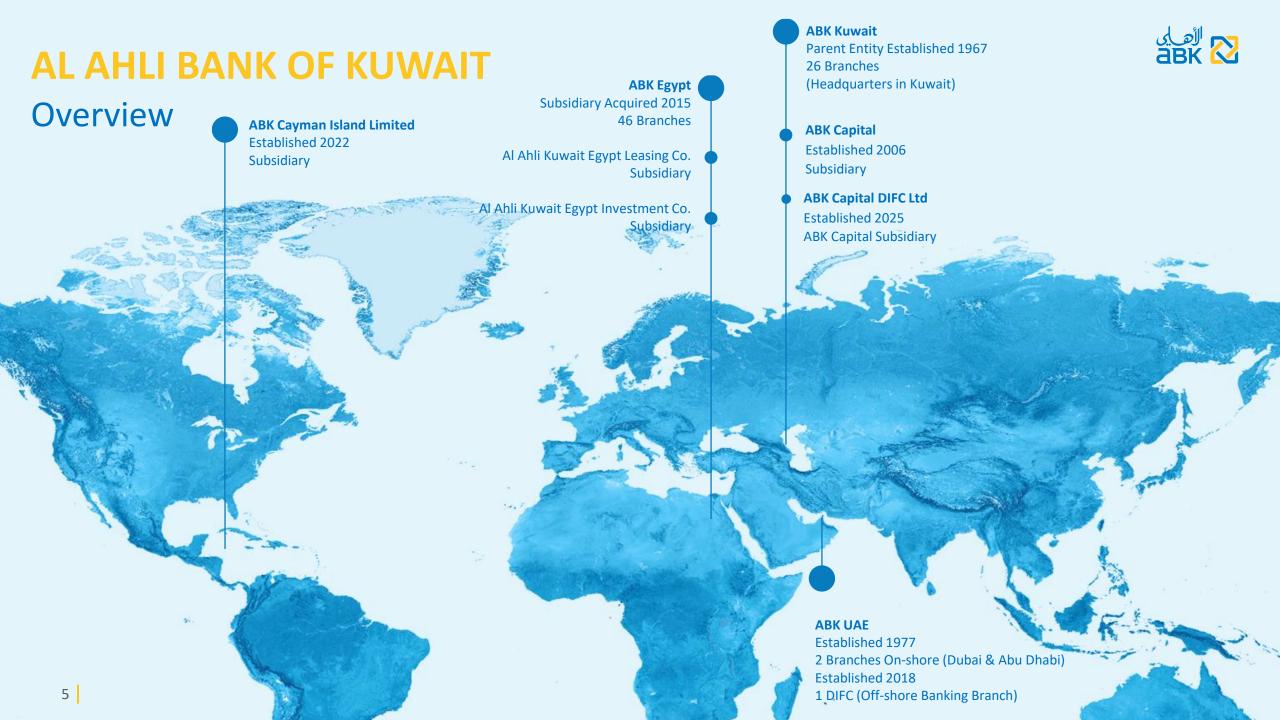

ABK OVERVIEW & BACKGROUND





Established in 1967 by the Behbehani family, ABK has steadily become one of the leading Kuwaiti Banks retaining the same core shareholder base since its establishment.



Headquartered in Kuwait City, the Group has three subsidiaries: Ahli Capital Investment Company, Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait – Egypt and ABK Cayman Island Limited, a branch network in UAE including an off- shore banking branch in DIFC with a Category 1 license.



Provides a wide range of financial and banking services and products across all its markets which include: Corporate Banking, Retail Banking, Treasury & Investments.



Has a total of 75 branches in three countries: 26 in Kuwait, 2 full-service branches in Abu Dhabi & Dubai & 1 offshore banking branch in Dubai International Financial Centre (DIFC), & 46 branches in Egypt.



Strong and well-established access to market by the issuances of KD 50 million subordinated Tier II bond in Oct-21 and another issuance of subordinated Tier II bond of KD 50 million in Nov-22



In Sep-23 successfully completed a capital increase of KD 100 million (share capital of KD 50 million & share premium of KD 50 million) representing 26.7% with an initial coverage of 331.4%



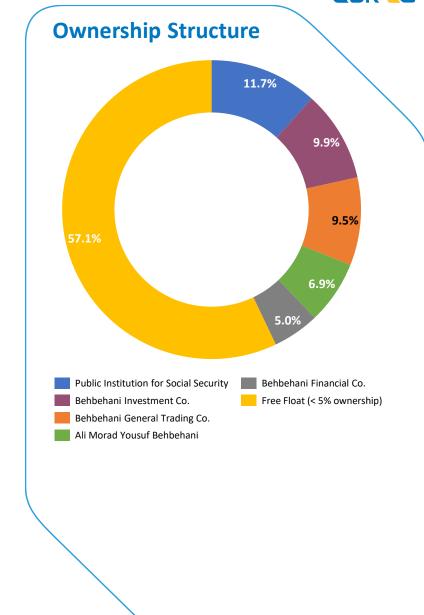
In Sep-24 successful completion of the issuance of Additional Tier 1 (AT1) perpetual bonds capital in value of US\$300 Million



In H1 2025, ABK successfully raised a 36 month + 1 week syndicated loan financing in DIFC branch. The deal was well received in the international and regional markets, successfully consolidating 20 global investors from North America, Europe, Asia and Middle East. Additionally, the transaction was successfully upsized by 33% from the initial launch amount, to close at a benchmark size of US\$ 1 billion.



In June 25, ABK obtained Central Bank approval to launch its first Certificate of Deposit Program of US\$ 500 million, aimed at diversifying liquidity sources and reducing reliance on conventional funding, supporting more sustainable growth across our banking operations. By the third quarter, Treasury successfully executed and fully subscribed the entire program within a month of launch, by international investors from Asia and the United States, across various maturities at highly competitive pricing levels.

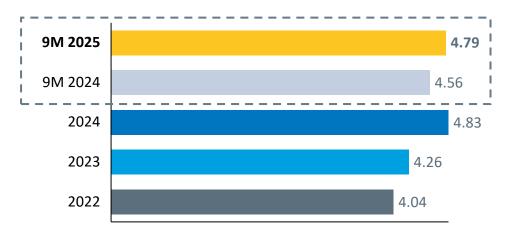

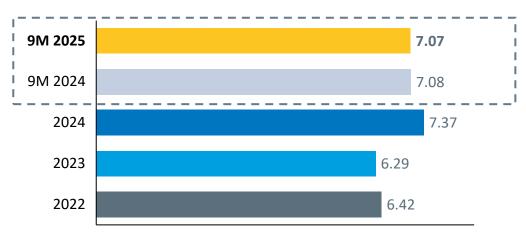

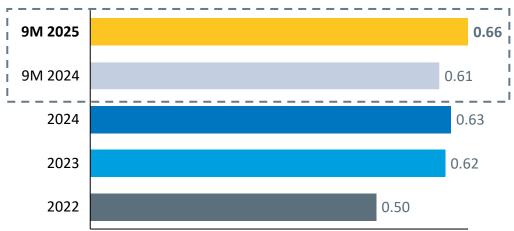

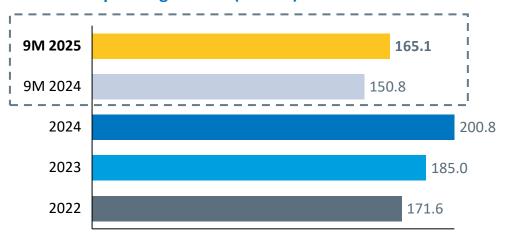

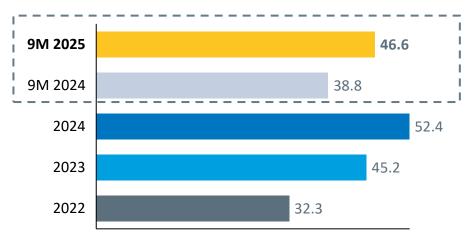
Total Operating Income (KD'Mn)

Net Profit Attributable to Shareholders' of the Bank (KD'Mn)



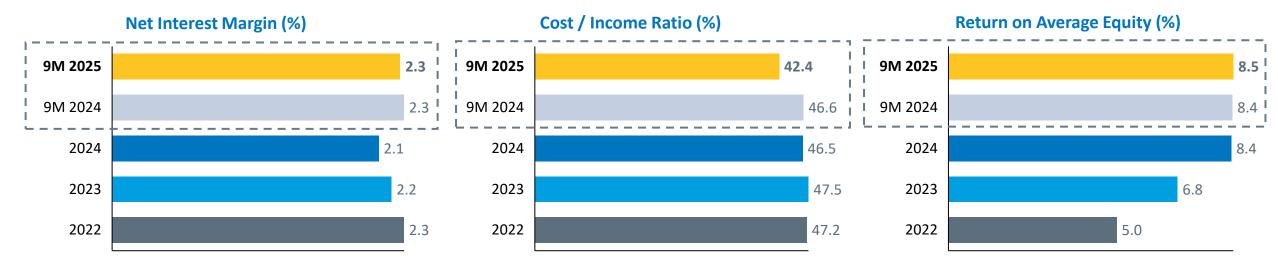
Loans to Deposit Ratio (%)*

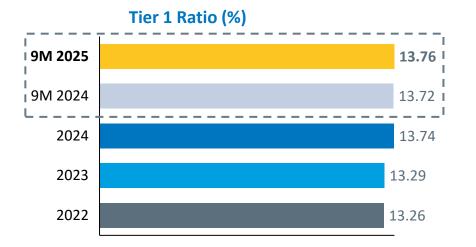


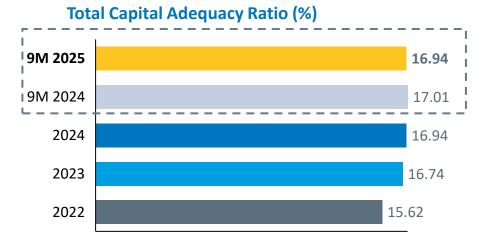

Evolution of oil price and Kuwait's average daily crude oil production



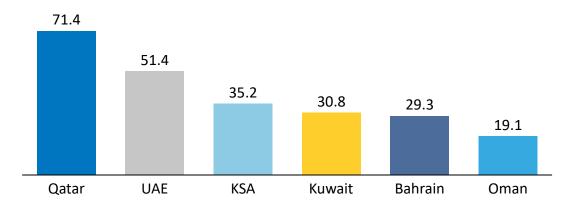

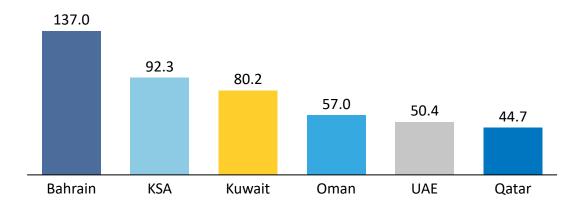

SNAPSHOT OF KUWAIT'S BANKING SECTOR





The banking sector is regulated by the CBK. Leading supervisory practices are in place to monitor interest rates charged, lending limits and concentrations, investment limits, liquidity, and capital adequacy



Provisions required by CBK instructions have been more precautionary in nature and higher than the ECL calculated under IFRS 9 according to CBK guidelines creating additional buffers in the banking system



The government's financial strength reinforce both capacity and willingness to provide support to the banking sector



Capital adequacy standards under the Basel III framework were introduced by CBK in June 2014



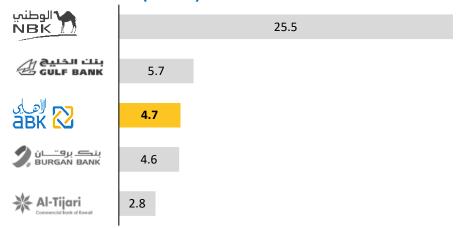

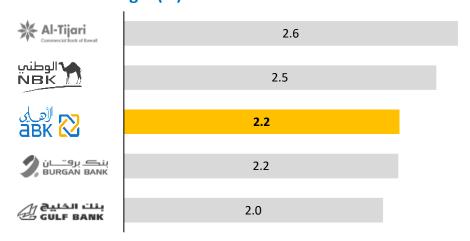

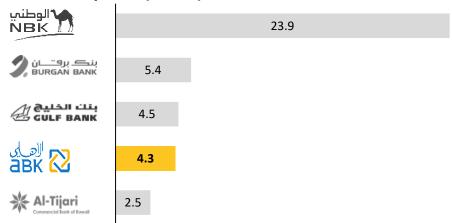

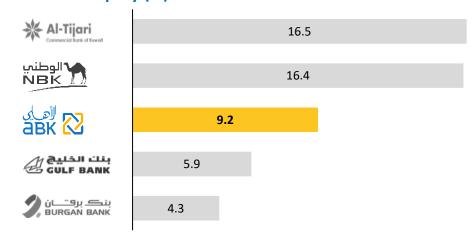
Net Interest Margin (%)

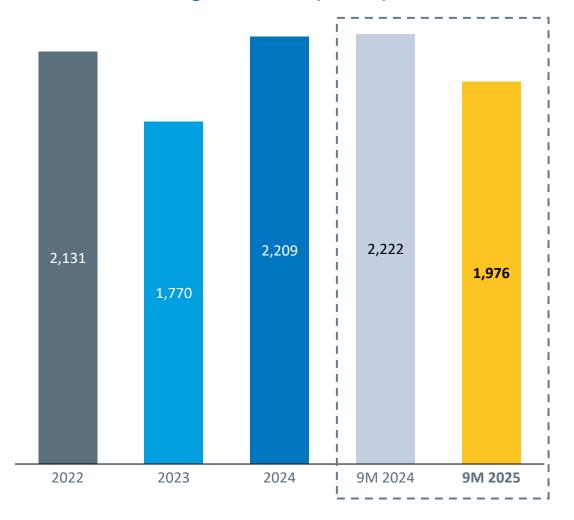
TREASURY & INVESTMENTS



Treasury & Investment

- The Group's Treasury manages the Group's assets and liabilities and liquidity requirements under the supervision of the Asset and Liabilities Committee (ALCO)
- Manages the money market books and money market funding positions for the Group's own account to fund its domestic and international foreign-currency assets
- Undertakes a range of foreign exchange business, across both spot and forward markets, largely on behalf of the Group's customer base, and conducts a limited amount of proprietary foreign exchange trading within the constraints of what the Group considers to be prudent risk guidelines
- Maintains a portfolio of government treasury bills and bonds to meet relevant regulatory requirements and to manage surplus domestic currency liquidity
- The Group's investment unit is responsible for managing the Group's fixed income portfolio with the objective of realizing income while minimizing the risk of default

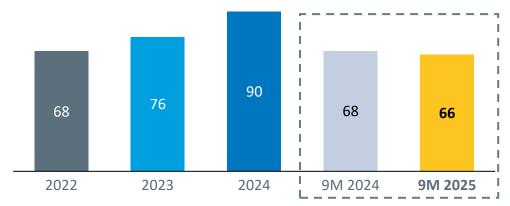

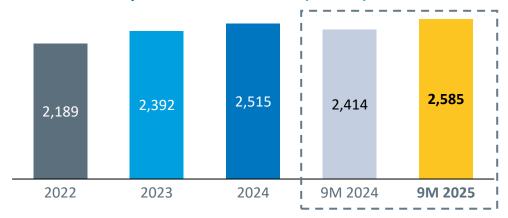
Al Ahli Bank of Kuwait - UAE

- DIFC branch was inaugurated in Apr'18 and was granted the Category 1 license in Jan'22

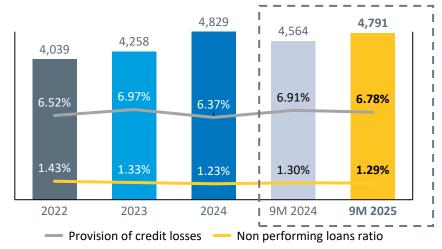

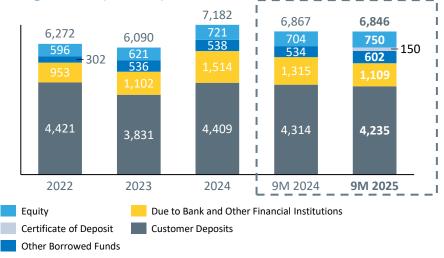

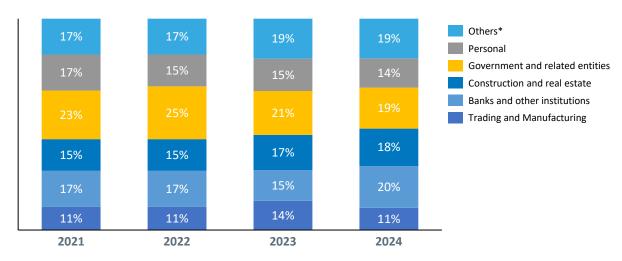
Loan Portfolio (KD'Mn)



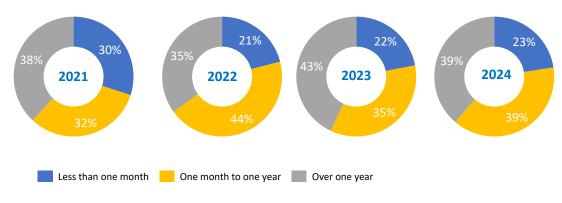
Funding Profile (KD'Mn)

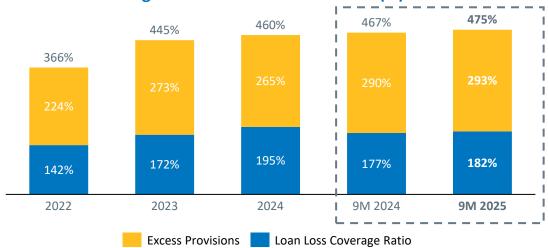

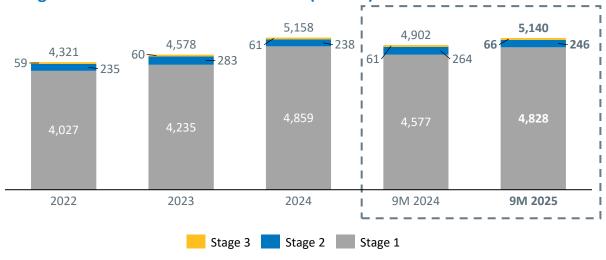
Non-Performing Loan Ratio (%)

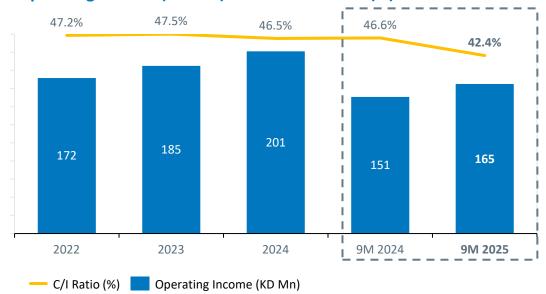




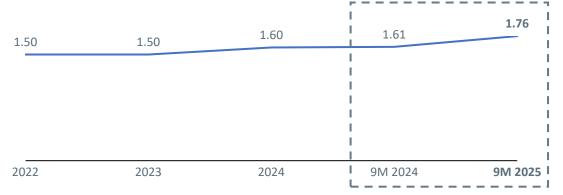

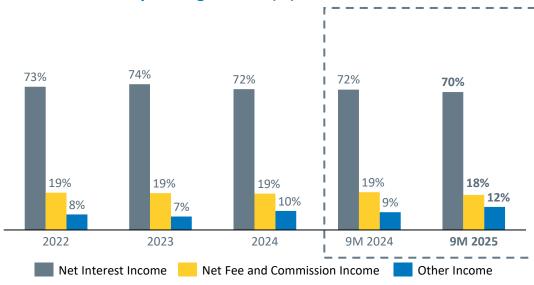
Operating Income (KD'Mn) vs Cost to Income (%)

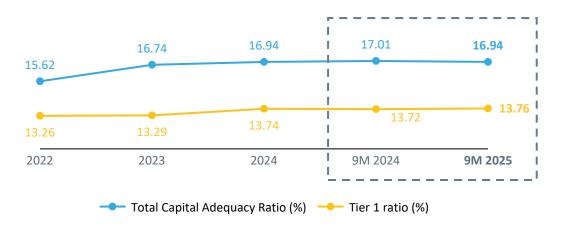




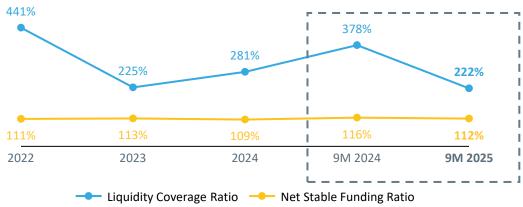

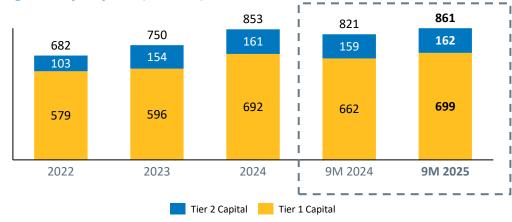
Tier 1 Ratio and Capital Adequacy Ratio (%)
